# **Commissions for Women Round Table Meeting**

Saturday, November 17, 2018 Notre Dame of Maryland University Baltimore, MD

On a chilly, rainy day in November, 32 representatives of 11 Commissions for Women from the various jurisdictions of Maryland gathered to share information, ideas and strategies for improving the lives of women and girls in their communities.

Maryland has 23 counties and the city of Baltimore. Fourteen of these have an officially established advisory board on women's issues – a Commission for Women. Ten of those commissions sent a delegation to this meeting, organized by the Maryland state Commission for Women (MCW). Represented at the meeting were delegations Anne Arundel, Baltimore, Calvert, Charles, Frederick, Harford, Howard, Montgomery, Prince George's and Washington Counties.

The Commission for Women Roundtable Meeting was held in concert with the annual fall conference of the Maryland Legislative Agenda for Women (MLAW). The MCW invited each county/city Commission for Women (CFW) to send two representatives to the MLAW Conference and to stay later for the CFW Roundtable Meeting. In this way, the CFW representatives can hear from state-wide women's advocacy organizations about issues that will be considered in the Maryland General Assembly in 2019. They then have time to meet with representatives of other Commissions for Women in our state to learn from each other and to discuss strategies and issues unique to these governmentally-established advisory boards.

Three speakers addressed the Roundtable: Mary Margaret Revell Goodwin discussed the plans to establish a Museum of Maryland Women's History in Queen Anne's County – with the goal of opening in 2020. Amanda Rodriguez of the University of Maryland SAFE Center for victims of human trafficking invited the commissions to help establish a state-wide network of attorneys who will offer legal services at a reduced fee to trafficking victims. Amanda Costley discussed the Maryland Women's Hall of Fame and Women of Tomorrow Awards and urged the commissioners to consider nominating women and girls from their communities for these honors.

After these presentations, the MCW provided a briefing on its Voices of Maryland Women Listening Tour and the findings in its recently published report, outlining the "top five" issues identified by the women who participated in the public forums and the survey. The commissioners were asked to share their commissions' top three projects for this year, and charts were created to see whether and how the commissions are addressing those top five issues:

The Commissions for Women in Maryland can work together, and independently to address issues at the local level and those that can be addressed collectively at the state level.
