





How many individuals participated in MORA programs\* in FY25?




## HUMANITARIAN IMMIGRANT POPULATIONS






## AREAS/COUNTIES

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*MORA providers helped program participants of all ages and backgrounds find and apply for jobs, receive certifications needed to build careers, learn language skills to be successful, engage in social opportunities to connect and build community, and receive support to foster self-sufficiency, stability, and well-being. From after-school programming helping refugee youth acclimate to their new school systems to scholarships for vocational courses to build and rebuild the careers skilled professionals had in their home countries, MORA's service participants saw many success stories, such as from a student learning English through a local community college, "In our class, we have students from different countries like Haiti, Afghanistan, and Nicaragua. We all speak different languages, but in class we practice English together....My experience has been life-changing. Everyday I feel more confident."*
